## School Parliament

Year 6 pupils from our School Parliament have been working hard over the course of the year on a range of exciting events and activities gauged towards empowering children to make a real difference within their local community and wider city.

Caoilin McConville from the design and planning department at Liverpool city council worked with our Parliament pupils on a project which encouraged them to think about their vision for an ideal home for the future. Children were urged to think about environmental factors in their designs and what the implications might be for our planet. Pupils then came back into school and launched a competition to the rest of the school, inviting them to design their own 'ideal home'. Entries were then submitted to Liverpool City Council where they were judged alongside ideas from other Liverpool schools.

We were extremely proud to hear back from the Council that two of our pupils had been selected as prize winners with their amazing, innovative designs! Ella from Year 1S won 1st prize whilst Dinsari from Year 3 won 3rd prize. Caoilin came into school to award prizes to our winners and both girls were presented with art sets.

The children's design ideas will form part of a guide for the city which will hopefully be published by local architects later this year.

Year 4 pupils were invited to visit a Synagogue this half term. They were treated to a guided tour, finding out that a Synagogue is a place of worship for people of the Jewish religion. They also found out that Jews use Synagogues as places to meet as well as to study.

Pupils also got to see the Synagogue's ark (a special cabinet that hold the Torah scrolls) and they listened carefully as it was explained to them that the ark is most important thing inside a Synagogue as it hold the Torah (the holy book of Judaism).

They also got to see the special platform called a bimah, where a reader reads the Torah to the worshippers and they found out that worship services usually take place on Friday nights and Saturday mornings and on holy days and festivals.










