- Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and during role-play.

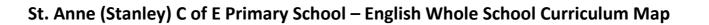

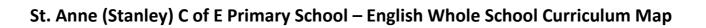

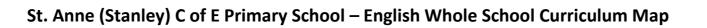
